Dear Ms. Persak,

Pursuant to Article 1, Section 24 of the Florida Constitution and Florida Senate Rule 1.48, American Oversight makes the following request for records.

Requested Records

American Oversight requests that the Florida Senate promptly produce the following:

All records reflecting the contents of and attendees to the following events:

- 1. The 46th American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) Annual Meeting, held August 14-16, 2019 in Austin, Texas.
- 2. The August 15, 2019 workshop entitled, "What is Redistricting and Why Must We Do It?" at the 46th ALEC Annual Meeting in Austin, Texas.
- 3. The August 15, 2019 workshop entitled, "Navigating the Constitutional and Legal Complexities of Redistricting" at the 46th ALEC Annual Meeting in Austin, Texas.

This request encompasses any documents prepared in advance of the meeting; written communications about the meeting; agendas; lists of meeting attendees; minutes; summaries; slideshow presentations; or materials exchanged before, during, or after the meeting.

In an effort to accommodate the Senate and reduce the number of potentially responsive records, American Oversight requests that you search the files of only the following senators and their staff members:

Please provide all responsive records from July 15, 2019, to the date the search is conducted.

Please notify American Oversight of any anticipated fees or costs in excess of \$100 prior to incurring such costs or fees.

American Oversight seeks all responsive records regardless of format, medium, or physical characteristics. In conducting your search, please understand the terms "records," and "documents," in their broadest sense, to include any written, typed, recorded, graphic, printed, or audio material of any kind. We seek records of any kind, including electronic records, audiotapes, videotapes, and photographs, as well as letters, emails, facsimiles, telephone messages, voice mail messages, and transcripts, notes, or minutes of any meetings, telephone conversations, or discussions. Our request includes any attachments to these records. No category of material should be omitted from search, collection, and production.

In addition, American Oversight insists that the Senate use the most up-to-date technologies to search for responsive information and take steps to ensure that the most complete repositories of information are searched. American Oversight is available to work with you to craft appropriate search terms. However, custodian searches are still required; your office may not have direct access to files stored in .PST files, outside of network drives, in paper format, or in personal email accounts.

In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records. If it is your position that a document contains non-exempt segments, but that those non-exempt segments are so dispersed throughout the document as to make segregation impossible, please state what portion of the document is non-exempt, and how the material is dispersed throughout the document. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically that it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.

Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by your office before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

To ensure that this request is properly construed, that searches are conducted in an adequate but efficient manner, and that extraneous costs are not incurred, American Oversight welcomes an opportunity to discuss its request with you before you undertake your search or incur search or duplication costs. By working together at the outset, American Oversight and the Senate can decrease the likelihood of costly and time-consuming litigation in the future.

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Where possible, please provide responsive material in electronic format by email or in PDF or TIF format on a USB drive. Please send any responsive material being sent by mail to American Oversight, 1030 15th Street NW, Suite B255, Washington, DC 20005. If it will accelerate release of responsive records to American Oversight, please also provide responsive material on a rolling basis.

Conclusion

American Oversight is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit with the mission to promote transparency in government, to educate the public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media.
