Re: Freedom of Information Act Request

Dear FOIA Officers:

Pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), 5 U.S.C. § 552, and the implementing regulations of your agency, American Oversight makes the following request for records.

On May 8, 2019, FBI Counterterrorism Division Assistant Director Michael C. McGarrity testified before the House Homeland Security Committee that the FBI considered "abortion extremism" to be a form of domestic terrorism. More recently, on February 5, 2020, FBI Director Christopher Wray stated before the House Judiciary Committee that the FBI recently reorganized its categorization of terrorism efforts—and that the Bureau now classifies "abortion violent extremism" as a form of domestic terrorism. Apart from

asserting that there are a "variety of kinds of violence under [the abortion] issue", Mr. Wray did not provide further descriptions or examples of this type of extremist. American Oversight seeks records to shed light on the evidence upon which the FBI relied when classifying pro-choice extremism as a domestic terror threat.

Requested Records

American Oversight requests that your agency produce the following records within twenty business days:

- 1. All email communications (including emails, email attachments, calendar invitations, and attachments thereto) <u>sent</u> by of the officials listed below containing the following key words:

In an effort to accommodate your agency and reduce the number of potentially responsive records to be processed and produced, American Oversight has limited its request to emails sent by the Commerce custodians listed above. To be clear, however, American Oversight still requests that complete email chains be produced, displaying both sent and received messages. This means, for example, that both Secretary Ross's response to an email from Senator McConnell and the initial received message are responsive to this request and should be produced.

- 2. Any statistics, data points, or other evidence the FBI used to inform its 2019-2020 categorization of pro-choice violence as domestic terrorism.
- 3. Any documents containing statistics, data points, or other evidence describing the incidence or prevalence of "pro choice" or "abortion violent" extremism.
- 4. Records sufficient to identify the amount of funds within the FBI's budget dedicated to preventing or combating "abortion violent extremism."
- 5. Any guidance documents, training materials, policies, procedures, or instructions created or used by the FBI describing how to identify "abortion violent extremism."

American Oversight believes your agency is best positioned to determine where responsive records to parts 2-5 may reside. American Oversight believes, at a minimum, a search for responsive records should include the offices of your agency leadership, any offices charged with tracking domestic terrorism issues including "abortion violent extremism," and your agency's budget office.

For all parts of this request, please produce all responsive records from January 20, 2017 through the date of search.

Fee Waiver Request

In accordance with 5 U.S.C. § 552(a) (4) (A) (iii) and your agency's regulations, American Oversight requests a waiver of fees associated with processing this request for records. The subject of this request concerns the operations of the federal government, and the disclosures will likely contribute to a better understanding of relevant government procedures by the general public in a significant way. Moreover, the request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.

American Oversight requests a waiver of fees because disclosure of the requested information is "in the public interest because it is likely to contribute significantly to

public understanding of operations or activities of the government."³ The public has a significant interest in understanding which groups constitute domestic terror threats and what evidence the FBI uses in those determinations. Records with the potential to shed light on this matter would contribute significantly to public understanding of operations of the federal government, including the process to categorize groups as domestic extremists. American Oversight is committed to transparency and makes the responses agencies provide to FOIA requests publicly available, and the public's understanding of the government's activities would be enhanced through American Oversight's analysis and publication of these records.

This request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.⁴ As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, American Oversight does not have a commercial purpose and the release of the information requested is not in American Oversight's financial interest. American Oversight's mission is to promote transparency in government, to educate the public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.⁵

American Oversight has also demonstrated its commitment to the public disclosure of documents and creation of editorial content through numerous substantive analyses posted to its website.⁶ Examples reflecting this commitment to the public disclosure of documents and the creation of editorial content include the posting of records related to an ethics waiver received by a senior Department of Justice attorney and an analysis of what those records demonstrated regarding the Department's process for issuing such waivers;⁷ posting records received as part of American Oversight's "Audit the Wall" project to gather and analyze information related to the administration's proposed construction of a barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border, and analyses of what those records reveal;⁸ posting

records regarding potential self-dealing at the Department of Housing & Urban Development and related analysis; posting records and analysis relating to the federal government's efforts to sell nuclear technology to Saudi Arabia; and posting records and analysis regarding the Department of Justice's decision in response to demands from Congress to direct a U.S. Attorney to undertake a wide-ranging review and make recommendations regarding criminal investigations relating to the President's political opponents and allegations of misconduct by the Department of Justice itself and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. 11

Accordingly, American Oversight qualifies for a fee waiver.

Guidance Regarding the Search & Processing of Requested Records

In connection with its request for records, American Oversight provides the following guidance regarding the scope of the records sought and the search and processing of records:

- Please search all locations and systems likely to have responsive records, regardless of format, medium, or physical characteristics.
- Our request for records includes any attachments to those records or other
 materials enclosed with those records when they were previously transmitted. To
 the extent that an email is responsive to our request, our request includes all prior
 messages sent or received in that email chain, as well as any attachments to the
 email.
- Please search all relevant records or systems containing records regarding agency business. Do not exclude records regarding agency business contained in files, email accounts, or devices in the personal custody of your officials, such as personal email accounts or text messages. Records of official business conducted using unofficial systems or stored outside of official files are subject to the Federal

Records Act and FOIA.¹² It is not adequate to rely on policies and procedures that require officials to move such information to official systems within a certain period of time; American Oversight has a right to records contained in those files even if material has not yet been moved to official systems or if officials have, by intent or through negligence, failed to meet their obligations.¹³

- Please use all tools available to your agency to conduct a complete and efficient search for potentially responsive records. Agencies are subject to government-wide requirements to manage agency information electronically,¹⁴ and many agencies have adopted the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) Capstone program, or similar policies. These systems provide options for searching emails and other electronic records in a manner that is reasonably likely to be more complete than just searching individual custodian files. For example, a custodian may have deleted a responsive email from his or her email program, but your agency's archiving tools may capture that email under Capstone. At the same time, custodian searches are still necessary; agencies may not have direct access to files stored in .PST files, outside of network drives, in paper format, or in personal email accounts.
- In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically why it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.
- Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by the agency before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.
