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Re: Freedom of Information Act Request

Dear FOIA Officers:

Pursuant to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), 5 U.S.C. § 552, and the implementing regulations of your agency, American Oversight makes the following request for records.

In February 2018, the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) updated its guidance regarding political appointees converting to permanent positions in the civil service. American Oversight seeks records to shed light on the degree to which political appointees are converting to career civil service positions, as well as whether OPM's guidelines are being followed throughout the federal government.

Requested Records

American Oversight requests that your agency produce the following records within twenty business days:

- 1. Copies of any SF-50 forms for any political appointees* at the GS-13 level or higher at your agency reflecting a change to a permanent competitive, non-political excepted service, or career SES position.
- 2. Records sufficient to identify any requests to OPM (including any approvals, rejections, or other responses from OPM) to appoint any current or former (within five years) Executive Branch political appointees* at the GS-13 level or higher to permanent competitive, non-political excepted service, or career SES position (including but not limited to any pre-appointment request checklist forms OPM 5000 or 5001, or other forms used for the requests, documentation submitted with the requests, and decisions conveyed in response to the request).
- 3. Records sufficient to identify any requests to OPM (including any approvals, rejections, or other responses from OPM) under 5 CFR § 3318(a), (c)(1), for approval to pass over a preference eligible or object to an eligible (including but not limited to any forms SF-62 or other forms used for the request, documentation submitted with the requests, and decisions conveyed in response to the request).

*Please consider any employee in the following positions to be a "political appointee":

- a. Political appointees requiring Senate confirmation (PAS);
- b. Political appointees not requiring Senate confirmation (PA);
- c. Political appointees, as defined under 5 U.S.C. sections 5312 through 5316 (relating to the Executive Schedule);
- d. Political Schedule A:
- e. Appointments made by the President without confirmation by the Senate [5 CFR § 213.3102(c)].
- f. Assistants to top-level Federal officials if the position is being filled by a person designated by the President as a White House Fellow [5 CFR § 213.3102(z)].
- g. Schedule C [5 CFR \$\$ 213.3301-3302];
- h. Noncareer SES [5 U.S.C. § 3132(a) (7); and 5 CFR § 317, subpart F];
- i. Limited Term SES [5 U.S.C. § 3132(a) (5); and 5 CFR § 317, subpart F];
- j. Limited Emergency SES [5 U.S.C. § 3132(a)(6); and 5 CFR § 317, subpart F];
- k. Appointees serving in a political capacity under agency-specific authority; and
- l. Provisional Political Appointments [applicable to positions listed above].

We have no objection to the redaction of home addresses, telephone numbers, or social security numbers from SF-50s, SF-62s, or any other responsive forms.

For all parts of this request, please provide all responsive records from January 1, 2020, through the date of search.

Fee Waiver Request

In accordance with 5 U.S.C. § 552(a) (4) (A) (iii) and your agency's regulations, American Oversight requests a waiver of fees associated with processing this request for records. The subject of this request concerns the operations of the federal government, and the disclosures will likely contribute to a better understanding of relevant government procedures by the general public in a significant way. Moreover, the request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.

American Oversight requests a waiver of fees because disclosure of the requested information is "in the public interest because it is likely to contribute significantly to public understanding of operations or activities of the government."² The public has a

significant interest in understanding the extent to which political appointees are converting, or are planning to convert, to career status with the federal government. Records with the potential to shed light on this issue would contribute significantly to public understanding of operations of the federal government, including whether agency officials are following federal guidance in the process for converting from political to career status. American Oversight is committed to transparency and makes the responses agencies provide to FOIA requests publicly available, and the public's understanding of the government's activities would be enhanced through American Oversight's analysis and publication of these records.

This request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.³ As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, American Oversight does not have a commercial purpose and the release of the information requested is not in American Oversight's financial interest. American Oversight's mission is to promote transparency in government, to educate the public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.⁴

American Oversight has also demonstrated its commitment to the public disclosure of documents and creation of editorial content through numerous substantive analyses posted to its website.⁵ Examples reflecting this commitment to the public disclosure of documents and the creation of editorial content include the posting of records related to an ethics waiver received by a senior Department of Justice attorney and an analysis of what those records demonstrated regarding the Department's process for issuing such waivers;⁶ posting records received as part of American Oversight's "Audit the Wall" project to gather and analyze information related to the administration's proposed construction of a barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border, and analyses of what those records reveal;⁷ posting

records regarding potential self-dealing at the Department of Housing & Urban Development and related analysis;⁸ posting records and analysis relating to the federal government's efforts to sell nuclear technology to Saudi Arabia;⁹ and posting records and analysis regarding the Department of Justice's decision in response to demands from Congress to direct a U.S. Attorney to undertake a wide-ranging review and make recommendations regarding criminal investigations relating to the President's political opponents and allegations of misconduct by the Department of Justice itself and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.¹⁰

Accordingly, American Oversight qualifies for a fee waiver.

Guidance Regarding the Search & Processing of Requested Records

In connection with its request for records, American Oversight provides the following guidance regarding the scope of the records sought and the search and processing of records:

- Please search all locations and systems likely to have responsive records, regardless of format, medium, or physical characteristics. For instance, if the request seeks "communications," please search all locations likely to contain communications, including relevant hard-copy files, correspondence files, appropriate locations on hard drives and shared drives, emails, text messages or other direct messaging systems (such as iMessage, WhatsApp, Signal, or Twitter direct messages), voicemail messages, instant messaging systems such as Lync or ICQ, and shared messages systems such as Slack.
- In conducting your search, please understand the terms "record," "document," and "information" in their broadest sense, to include any written, typed, recorded, graphic, printed, or audio material of any kind. We seek records of any kind, including electronic records, audiotapes, videotapes, and photographs, as well as letters, emails, facsimiles, telephone messages, voice mail messages and transcripts, notes, or minutes of any meetings, telephone conversations or discussions.

- Our request for records includes any attachments to those records or other
 materials enclosed with those records when they were previously transmitted. To
 the extent that an email is responsive to our request, our request includes all prior
 messages sent or received in that email chain, as well as any attachments to the
 email.
- Please search all relevant records or systems containing records regarding agency business. Do not exclude records regarding agency business contained in files, email accounts, or devices in the personal custody of your officials, such as personal email accounts or text messages. Records of official business conducted using unofficial systems or stored outside of official files are subject to the Federal Records Act and FOIA.¹¹ It is not adequate to rely on policies and procedures that require officials to move such information to official systems within a certain period of time; American Oversight has a right to records contained in those files even if material has not yet been moved to official systems or if officials have, by intent or through negligence, failed to meet their obligations.¹²
- Please use all tools available to your agency to conduct a complete and efficient search for potentially responsive records. Agencies are subject to government-wide requirements to manage agency information electronically, and many agencies have adopted the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) Capstone program, or similar policies. These systems provide options for searching emails and other electronic records in a manner that is reasonably likely to be more complete than just searching individual custodian files. For example, a custodian may have deleted a responsive email from his or her email program, but your agency's archiving tools may capture that email under Capstone. At the same time, custodian searches are still necessary; agencies may not have direct access to files stored in .PST files, outside of network drives, in paper format, or in personal email accounts.
- In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the

- requested records. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically why it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.
- Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by the agency before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

Conclusion

If you have any questions regarding how to construe this request for records or believe that further discussions regarding search and processing would facilitate a more efficient production of records of interest to American Oversight, please do not hesitate to contact American Oversight to discuss this request. American Oversight welcomes an opportunity to discuss its request with you before you undertake your search or incur search or duplication costs. By working together at the outset, American Oversight and your agency can decrease the likelihood of costly and time-consuming litigation in the future.
