Re: Open Records Act Request

Dear Ms. Mohr:

Pursuant to the Oklahoma Open Records Act (ORA), Title 51, Oklahoma Statutes §§ 24A.1 et seq., American Oversight makes the following request for records.

On July 29, 2020, the United States Postal Service (USPS) issued a warning to 46 states and the District of Columbia—excluding only states that already conduct universal vote-by-mail elections—that delays in processing postage might result in ballots being uncounted. These letters were reportedly planned even before operational changes made by newly appointed Postmaster General Louis DeJoy, changes which have resulted in significant delays in mail delivery times, even as states prepare to send and receive record numbers of mail ballots.²

American Oversight seeks records with the potential to shed light on Oklahoma's preparedness for the November 2020 election, including communications with USPS in anticipation of widespread use of mail ballots.

Requested Records

American Oversight requests that your office produce the following within five business days:

All email communications (including emails, complete email chains, email attachments, calendar invitations, and attachments thereto) <u>sent by</u> (a) Secretary of the Election Board Paul Ziriax, or anyone communicating on his behalf, such as a scheduler or assistant, or Board Chairman Tom Montgomery, or anyone communicating on his behalf, such as a

scheduler or assistant, <u>to</u> (b) anyone with an email address ending in @usps.com or @usps.gov.

Please provide all responsive records from June 1, 2020, to the date the search is conducted.

American Oversight has limited its request to <u>sent</u> messages to reduce the volume of potentially responsive records. American Oversight still requests complete email chains. So, for example, if a government official sent a response to an incoming message from one of the email domains listed above, the email chain containing the initially received message and the response is responsive to this request.

Fees Waiver Request

In accordance with O.S. tit. 51, § 24A.5(4), American Oversight respectfully requests that your office charge no search fees in connection with processing this request for records. Release of the requested records is in the public interest because American Oversight, in accordance with its organizational mission, makes this request "to determine whether those entrusted with the affairs of the government are honestly, faithfully, and competently performing their duties as public servants." Specifically, the requested records have the potential to shed light on the actions of Oklahoma's public officials in preparing for administering an election during a global pandemic in which record numbers of voters are expected to cast ballots by mail.⁴

American Oversight's work is aimed solely at serving the public interest.⁵ As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, American Oversight does not have a commercial purpose and the release of the information requested is not in American Oversight's financial interest. Rather, American Oversight's mission is to serve the public by promoting transparency in government, educating the public about government activities, and ensuring the accountability of government officials. Similar to members of the news media, American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website⁶ and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.⁷ American Oversight has demonstrated its commitment to

the public disclosure of documents and creation of editorial content through numerous substantive analyses posted to its website.⁸

American Oversight is committed to transparency and makes the responses agencies provide to public records requests publicly available, and the public's understanding of the government's activities, including whether public servants are honestly, faithfully, and competently performing their duties, would be enhanced through American Oversight's analysis and publication of these records.

Furthermore, in accordance with O.S. tit. 51, § 24A.5(4), American Oversight respectfully requests that you limit any copying fees to the reasonable, direct costs of record copying, or mechanical reproduction, if any such costs are incurred.

American Oversight asks that if its request for a fee waiver is denied in whole or in part, that you contact us prior to incurring any costs.

Guidance Regarding the Search & Processing of Requested Records

American Oversight insists that your agency use the most up-to-date technologies to search for responsive information and take steps to ensure that the most complete repositories of information are searched. American Oversight is available to work with you to craft appropriate search terms. However, custodian searches are still required; agencies may not have direct access to files stored in .PST files, outside of network drives, in paper format, or in personal email accounts.

In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure pursuant to the ORA, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records. If it is your position that a document contains non-exempt segments, but that those non-exempt segments are so dispersed throughout the document as to make segregation impossible, please state what portion of the document is non-exempt, and how the material is dispersed throughout the document. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically that it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.

You should institute a preservation hold on information responsive to this request. American Oversight intends to pursue all legal avenues to enforce its right of access under the ORA, including litigation if necessary. Accordingly, your agency is on notice that litigation is reasonably foreseeable.

To ensure that this request is properly construed, that searches are conducted in an adequate but efficient manner, and that extraneous costs are not incurred, American Oversight welcomes an opportunity to discuss its request with you before you undertake your search or incur search or duplication costs. By working together at the outset, American Oversight and you can decrease the likelihood of costly and time-consuming litigation in the future.

If it will accelerate release of responsive records to American Oversight, please also provide responsive material on a rolling basis.
