**Re: Public Information Request**

Dear Ms. Downey:

Pursuant to the Texas Public Information Act, as codified at Tex. Code ch. 552, American Oversight makes the following request for public records.

**Requested Records**

American Oversight requests that the Texas Office of the Attorney General (OAG) promptly produce the following:

1. Records sufficient to identify the following staffing information for OAG employees working on matters concerning election integrity:
  - a. Names,<sup>1</sup> job titles, and office locations of each OAG employee permanently assigned to the “election integrity initiative” or Election Fraud Section.
  - b. Names,<sup>2</sup> job titles, office locations, and the permanent or usual job assignment of each OAG employee temporarily assigned to the “election integrity initiative” or Election Fraud Section.
  - c. Names, job titles, and office locations, of each OAG employee not assigned to the “election integrity initiative” or Election Fraud Section but either permanently or temporarily working on matters concerning

election integrity, election fraud, or working as support to the “election integrity initiative” or Election Fraud Section.

For item 1 of this request, American Oversight requests records sufficient to identify this information on a monthly basis, from January 2020, through October 2020. Please keep in mind that records reflecting the requested data for the relevant timeframe may have been created outside the timeframe. To the extent the OAG maintains this data in a database, American Oversight requests the records in a spreadsheet exported from the database.

2. Records sufficient to identify any projects assigned to any OAG employee either permanently or temporarily assigned to the election integrity initiative or Election Fraud Section intended to target election fraud in a specific geographical location.

For item 2 of this request, please provide all responsive records from December 1, 2019, to the date the search is conducted.

American Oversight seeks all responsive records regardless of format, medium, or physical characteristics. In conducting your search, please understand the term “record” in its broadest sense, to include any written, typed, recorded, graphic, printed, or audio material of any kind. We seek records of any kind, including electronic records, audiotapes, videotapes, and photographs, as well as letters, emails, facsimiles, telephone messages, voice mail messages and transcripts, notes, or minutes of any meetings, telephone conversations or discussions. Our request includes any attachments to these records. **No category of material should be omitted from search, collection, and production.**

In addition, American Oversight insists that your office use the most up-to-date technologies to search for responsive information and take steps to ensure that the most complete repositories of information are searched. American Oversight is available to work with you to craft appropriate search terms. **However, custodian searches are still required; governmental authorities may not have direct access to files stored in .PST files, outside of network drives, in paper format, or in personal email accounts.**

Please search all records regarding official business. **You may not exclude searches of files or emails in the personal custody of your officials, such as personal email accounts.** Emails conducting government business sent or received on the personal account of a governmental authority’s officer or employee constitutes a record for purposes of the Texas Public Information Act.<sup>3</sup>

In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records. If it is your position that a document contains non-exempt segments, but that those non-exempt segments are so dispersed throughout the document as to make segregation impossible, please state what portion of the document is non-exempt, and how the material is dispersed throughout the

document. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically that it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.

Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by your office before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

To ensure that this request is properly construed, that searches are conducted in an adequate but efficient manner, and that extraneous costs are not incurred, American Oversight welcomes an opportunity to discuss its request with you before you undertake your search or incur search or duplication costs. By working together at the outset, American Oversight and the Office of the Attorney General can decrease the likelihood of costly and time-consuming litigation in the future.

Where possible, please provide responsive material in electronic format by email or in PDF or TIF format on a USB drive. Please send any responsive material being sent by mail to American Oversight, 1030 15th Street NW, Suite B255, Washington, DC 20005. If it will accelerate release of responsive records to American Oversight, please also provide responsive material on a rolling basis.

### **Fee Waiver Request**

In accordance with Tex. Code § 552.267(a), American Oversight requests a waiver of fees associated with processing this request for records because such a waiver “is in the public interest because providing the copy of the information primarily benefits the general public.” The requested records are directly related to the work of Texas state officials, with the potential to shed light on the extent to which the Office of the Attorney General is designating resources toward election integrity initiatives. Election integrity, voting rights, and allegations of voter fraud are subjects of substantial and increasing public interest, both in Texas and nationally.<sup>4</sup> Accordingly, release of records that may help the public to better understand the operations and activities of state officials working on election-related issues is in the public interest.

Release of the requested records will primarily benefit the public.<sup>5</sup> As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, American Oversight does not have a commercial purpose and the release of the requested records is not in American Oversight’s financial interest, but is rather in the public interest.

American Oversight is committed to transparency and makes the responses governmental authorities provide to public records requests publicly available. As noted, the subject of this request is a matter of public interest, and the public would benefit from an enhanced understanding of the government's activities through American Oversight's analysis and publication of these records. American Oversight's mission is to promote transparency in government, to educate the public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.<sup>6</sup>

American Oversight has also demonstrated its commitment to the public disclosure of documents and creation of editorial content through regular substantive analyses posted to its website.<sup>7</sup> Examples reflecting this commitment to the public disclosure of documents and the creation of editorial content include the posting of records related to the Trump Administration's contacts with Ukraine and analyses of those contacts;<sup>8</sup> posting records and editorial content about the federal government's response to the Coronavirus pandemic;<sup>9</sup> posting records received as part of American Oversight's "Audit the Wall" project to gather and analyze information related to the administration's proposed construction of a barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border, and analyses of what those records reveal;<sup>10</sup> the posting of records related to an ethics waiver received by a senior Department of Justice attorney and an analysis of what those records demonstrated regarding the Department's process for issuing such waivers;<sup>11</sup> and posting records and analysis of federal

officials' use of taxpayer dollars to charter private aircraft or use government planes for unofficial business.<sup>12</sup>

Accordingly, American Oversight qualifies for a fee waiver. If the Office of the Attorney General denies a fee waiver, please notify American Oversight of any anticipated fees or costs in excess of \$40 prior to incurring such costs or fees.

### **Conclusion**

We share a common mission to promote transparency in government. American Oversight looks forward to working with the Office of the Attorney General on this request.
