Re: Public Records Law Request

Dear Records Custodian:

Pursuant to the Louisiana Public Records Law, La. Rev. Stat. Ann. 44:1 et seq., American Oversight makes the following request for records.

In the final weeks of President Donald Trump's administration, Louisiana reportedly entered into an agreement with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security requiring that the agency give the state 180 days' notice before implementing any change in deportation policy.¹ American Oversight seeks records with the potential to shed light on the origins of this agreement.

Requested Records

American Oversight requests that the Office of the Attorney General produce the following records within three business days:

1. All email communications (including complete email chains, email attachments, and calendar invitations) between (a) any of the Office of the Attorney General officials listed below, and (b) former Senior Official Performing the Duties of Deputy Director of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Kenneth T. Cuccinelli or any other representative of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, including any person communicating from an email address ending in dhs.gov or ice.dhs.gov.

Specified OAG officials:

- a. Attorney General Jeff Landry, or anyone communicating on his behalf, such as an assistant or scheduler
- b. Any person serving as Chief of Staff to the Attorney General
- c. Solicitor General Elizabeth Murrill

2. All draft Sanctuary for Americans First Enactment (SAFE) agreements exchanged between the Office of the Attorney General and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

Please provide all responsive records from Nov. 3, 2020, through Jan. 20, 2021.

Fee Waiver Request

In accordance with La. Rev. Stat. Ann. 44:32(C)(2), American Oversight requests a waiver of fees associated with processing this request for records. A waiver of fees for this request is appropriate, because American Oversight's use of the requested records "will be limited to a public purpose."²

This request is made solely for a public purpose.³ The public has a significant interest in the origins of an agreement that has reportedly helped to slow the incoming presidential administration's implementation of its immigration policy priorities.⁴ Records with the potential to shed light on this matter would contribute significantly to public understanding of operations of the government, including the process by which this agreement was entered into. American Oversight is committed to transparency and makes the responses agencies provide to public records requests publicly available, and the public's understanding of the government's activities would be enhanced through American Oversight's analysis and publication of these records.

Furthermore, this request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes. As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, American Oversight does not have a commercial purpose and the release of the information requested is not in American Oversight's financial interest. American Oversight's mission is to promote transparency in government, to educate the public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.⁵

American Oversight has also demonstrated its commitment to the public disclosure of documents and creation of editorial content through regular substantive analyses

posted to its website.⁶ Examples reflecting this commitment to the public disclosure of documents and the creation of editorial content include the posting of records and analysis related to the organization's investigations into misconduct and corruption in state governments;⁷ posting records and analysis of federal and state governments' responses to the Coronavirus pandemic;⁸ posting records received as part of American Oversight's "Audit the Wall" project to gather and analyze information related to the Trump administration's proposed construction of a barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border, and analyses of what those records reveal;⁹ and the posting of records related to an ethics waiver received by a senior U.S. Department of Justice attorney and an analysis of what those records demonstrated regarding the Department's process for issuing such waivers.¹⁰

Accordingly, American Oversight qualifies for a fee waiver.

Guidance Regarding the Search & Processing of Requested Records

In connection with its request for records, American Oversight provides the following guidance regarding the scope of the records sought and the search and processing of records:

- Please search all locations and systems likely to have responsive records, regardless of format, medium, or physical characteristics.
- Our request for records includes any attachments to those records or other materials enclosed with those records when they were previously transmitted. To the extent that an email is responsive to our request, our request includes all prior messages sent or received in that email chain, as well as any attachments to the email.
- Please search all relevant records or systems containing records regarding agency business. Do not exclude records regarding agency business contained in files, email accounts, or devices in the personal custody of your officials, such as personal email accounts or text messages. Public business communications conducted on private email accounts and devices are public records subject to the Public Records Law.¹¹
- In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records. If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically why it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.
- Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by the agency before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

Conclusion

If you have any questions regarding how to construe this request for records or believe that further discussions regarding search and processing would facilitate a more efficient production of records of interest to American Oversight, please do not hesitate to contact American Oversight to discuss this request.
