Re: Freedom of Information Act Request

Dear Freedom of Information Officer:

Pursuant to the South Carolina Freedom of Information Act, S.C. Code Ann. § 30-4-10 et seq., American Oversight makes the following request for records.

Requested Records

American Oversight requests that your office promptly produce the following records:¹

All records reflecting communications (including emails, email attachments, text messages, messages on messaging platforms (such as Slack, GChat or Google Hangouts, Lync, Skype, or WhatsApp), telephone call logs, calendar invitations, calendar entries, meeting notices, meeting agendas, informational material, draft legislation, talking points, any handwritten or electronic notes taken during any oral communications, summaries of any oral communications, or other materials) between (a) Attorney General Alan Wilson, Solicitor General Robert Cook, Deputy Attorney General Jeff Young, or anyone communicating on their behalf (such as a Chief of Staff, assistant, or secretary), and (b) any of the external individuals or entities listed below.

Please provide all responsive records from January 20, 2021, through the date a search is conducted.

External Individuals and Entities:

1. President of the Conservative Partnership Institute Ed Corrigan (including but not limited to emails from the domain @cpi.org or @conservativepartnership.org)

2. Chief Operating Officer of the Conservative Partnership Institute Wesley Denton (including but not limited to emails from the domain @cpi.org or @conservativepartnership.org)
3. Anyone communicating from America First Legal including Stephen Miller, Mark Meadows, Matthew Whitaker, Russ Vought, Gene Hamilton, Reed Rubinstein, Ken Starr, Jim DeMint or anyone communicating from an email address ending in aflegal.org

Please note that American Oversight does not seek, and that this request specifically excludes, the initial mailing mass-distribution emails. However, subsequent communications forwarding such emails are responsive to this request. In other words, for example, if Attorney General Wilson received a mass-distribution email from a specified individual or domain that initial email would not be responsive to this request. However, if Attorney General Wilson forwarded that email to another individual with his own commentary, that subsequent message would be responsive to this request and should be produced. Additionally, this request excludes previously produced materials.

Fee Waiver Request

In accordance with S.C. Code Ann. § 30-4-30(B), American Oversight requests a waiver of fees associated with processing this request for records. Disclosure of the requested records is in the public interest because it will likely contribute to a better understanding of relevant government procedures by the general public in a significant way. In addition, this request is primarily and fundamentally for non-commercial purposes.

A waiver of fees is “in the public interest because furnishing the information can be considered as primarily benefiting the general public.”² The general public has a significant interest in understanding communications that top state officials may have had with certain external entities. Records with the potential to shed light on this matter would contribute significantly to public understanding of operations of the government, including whether and to what extent these external entities have influenced decisions that have affected South Carolinians. American Oversight is committed to transparency and makes the responses agencies provide to public records requests publicly available, and the public’s understanding of the government’s activities would be enhanced through American Oversight’s analysis and publication of these records.

Furthermore, American Oversight’s work is aimed solely at serving the public interest. As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, American Oversight does not have a commercial purpose and the release of the information requested is not in American Oversight’s financial interest. American Oversight’s mission is to promote transparency in government, to educate the public about government activities, and to ensure the accountability of government officials. American Oversight uses the information gathered, and its analysis of it, to educate the public through reports, press releases, or

other media. American Oversight also makes materials it gathers available on its public website and promotes their availability on social media platforms, such as Facebook and Twitter.³

American Oversight has also demonstrated its commitment to the public disclosure of documents and creation of editorial content through regular substantive analyses posted to its website.⁴ Examples reflecting this commitment to the public disclosure of documents and the creation of editorial content include the posting of records and analysis related to the organization’s investigations into misconduct and corruption in state governments;⁵ posting records and analysis of federal and state governments’ responses to the Coronavirus pandemic;⁶ posting records received as part of American Oversight’s “Audit the Wall” project to gather and analyze information related to the Trump administration’s proposed construction of a barrier along the U.S.-Mexico border, and analyses of what those records reveal;⁷ and the posting of records related to an ethics waiver received by a senior Department of Justice attorney and an

analysis of what those records demonstrated regarding the Department's process for issuing such waivers.⁸

Accordingly, American Oversight qualifies for a fee waiver.

Guidance Regarding the Search & Processing of Requested Records

In connection with its request for records, American Oversight provides the following guidance regarding the scope of the records sought and the search and processing of records:

- Our request for records includes any attachments to those records or other materials enclosed with those records when they were previously transmitted. To the extent that an email is responsive to our request, our request includes all prior messages sent or received in that email chain, as well as any attachments to the email.
- Please search all relevant records or systems containing records regarding agency business. Do not exclude records regarding agency business contained in files, email accounts, or devices in the personal custody of your officials, such as personal email accounts or text messages.
- In the event some portions of the requested records are properly exempt from disclosure, please disclose any reasonably segregable non-exempt portions of the requested records.⁹ If a request is denied in whole, please state specifically why it is not reasonable to segregate portions of the record for release.
- Please take appropriate steps to ensure that records responsive to this request are not deleted by the agency before the completion of processing for this request. If records potentially responsive to this request are likely to be located on systems where they are subject to potential deletion, including on a scheduled basis, please take steps to prevent that deletion, including, as appropriate, by instituting a litigation hold on those records.

Conclusion
